#### 1. STUDIES, LEGISLATION AND CONVENTIONS:

CANADIAN BILL C-11 READY FOR THIRD READING – After review by a Special Legislative Committee, Bill C-11 (The Copyright Modernization Act) is back at the House of Commons for third reading. Following a vote by Parliament, the bill will be sent to the Senate. FRENCH LEGISLATION WILL MANAGE OUT-OF-PRINT WORKS – France has passed an Act to put a mechanism in place to regulate the use of commercially non-available works. A database will be created and managed by the French National Library and a collective rights management society will authorize reproduction of these materials.

## 2. LEGAL CASES:

NATIONAL ARCHIVES EMPLOYEE ADMITS COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT – A technician at the U.S. National Archives and Records Administration has pleaded guilty to selling unauthorized copies of movies and music using his government email to advertise and negotiate sales. Timajin Neil not only used his personal computers to reproduce these materials but also used his government computer to produce and store thousands of files. His scheme came to an end when he sold a \$5US DVD to an undercover agent.

COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT BRINGS SEVERE PENALTY – After pleading guilty to two federal charges of copyright infringement, a Winnipeg man was given an 18-month sentence of strict house arrest and a \$20,000CDN fine for selling unauthorized digital copies of TV shows, music and software.

ENCYCLOPEDIA BRITANNICA PRODUCES FINAL PRINT VERSION -

The Encyclopedia Britannica has announced that after 244 years, dozens of editions and more than 7 million sets sold, no new print versions will be published. The 32 volumes of the 2010 installment were the last print versions; all future editions will be exclusively online.

CELEBRATE UPCOMING COPYRIGHT DAYS – April 23 has been designated "World Book and Copyright Day" as the day to promote the protection of the written word and to recognize authors and their rights. April 26 is "World Intellectual Property Day" and copyright and IP awareness day around the world.

NEW OPEN ACCESS POLICY AT WORLD BANK – The World Bank has announced that effective July 1, 2012, all their published research and knowledge materials will be licensed under a Creative Commons Attribution License. As a first phase of this policy, the Bank launched an Open Knowledge Repository with more that 2,000 Creative Commons licensed works. AUCC AND ACCESS COPYRIGHT AGREE TO MODEL LICENCE – The Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada and Access Copyright, the Canadian Copyright Licensing Agency, have reached agreement on a model licence for post-secondary use of print and digital material. The licence includes an annual fee of \$26CDN per FTE. Over the next six months, a survey will be developed to track usage of licensed content and ensure proper distribution of royalties to rightsholders.
